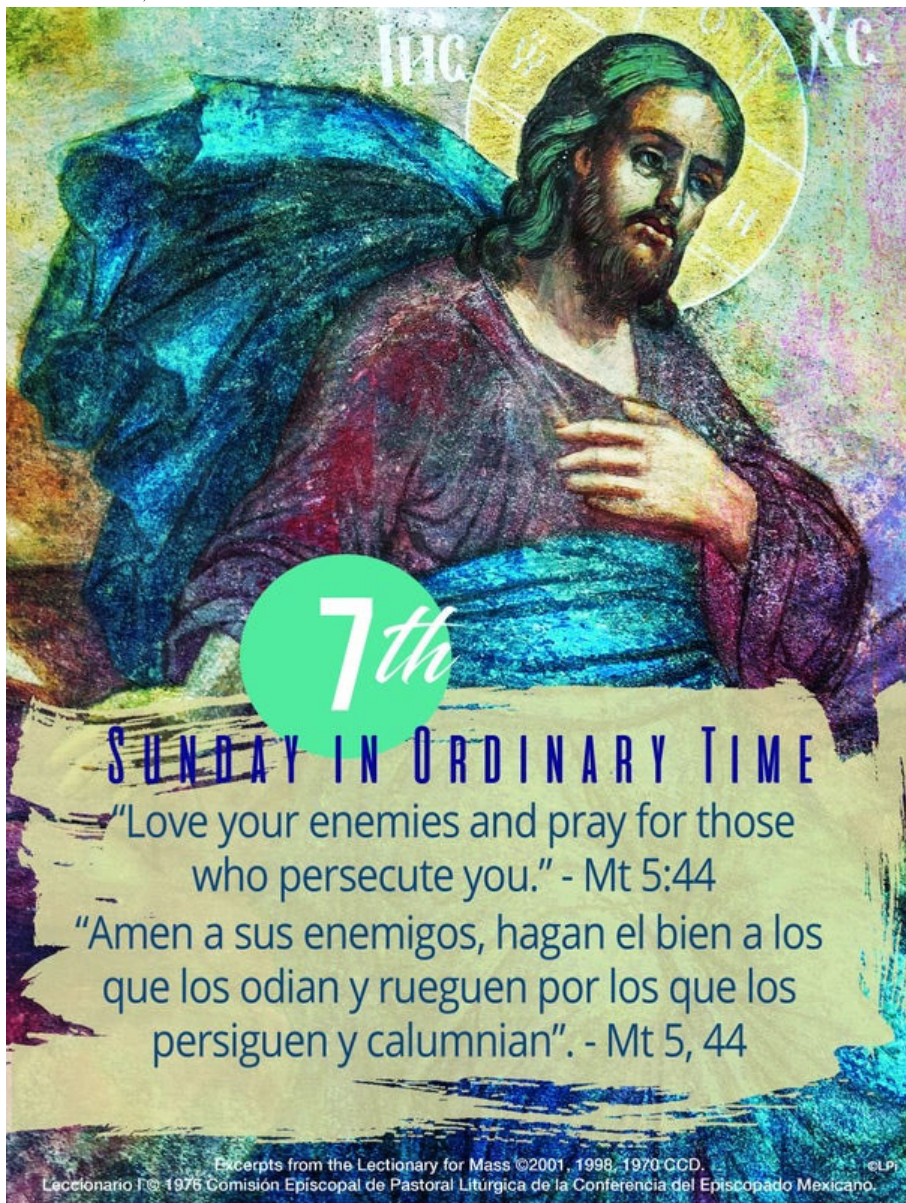

“Be holy, for I, the Lord, your God am holy” (Leviticus 19:1).

“Be perfect, just as your heavenly Father is perfect” (Matthew 5:48).

These two passages taken from this Sunday’s readings remind us of the challenged given to all the baptized. Yet, when hearing this, we may decide not even to try, because the task seems to be impossible. Can we really be like God?

Our catechism, echoing the words of the Book of Genesis, teaches that we are made “in the image and likeness of God.” If God, therefore is holy and perfect, we also have that capability. As we have heard often, we cannot let the perfect be the enemy of the good. We strive toward holiness little by little, poco a poco, and we must not be discouraged if it takes a long time or even, at times, seems impossible. With God, all things are possible, even, by God’s grace, achieving holiness that mirrors God’s holiness.

As we approach the season of Lent, the final period of preparation for those to be baptized or received into the Church, we use this coming 40 days to rediscover the life of Baptism that is ours. That is the reason Easter is so full of the symbols of Baptism, including the weekly sprinkling with baptismal water. Please join us on Ash Wednesday as we enter into this time of “retreat” for us and all Christians.

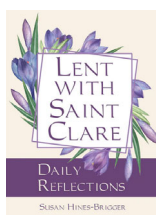
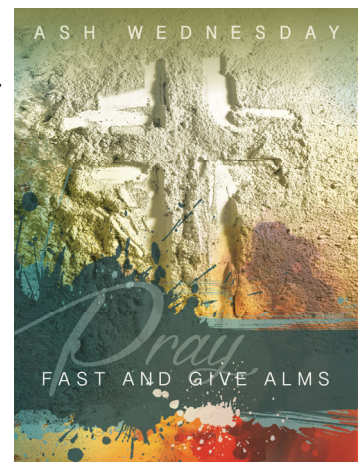
Ash Wednesday Schedule

Stations of the Cross – Via Crucis – Way of the Cross

One of the historic and popular Lenten devotions is the Way of the Cross, tracing the steps of Jesus from His arrest and ending with His Body being taken down from the Cross.

Our weekly celebrations will be on the Friday evenings of Lent (February 25 until March 31), at 6:30 pm, in the church. Our weekly celebration will be in English, Spanish and Portuguese. We look forward to being with you for this special Lenten observance.

Presidents' Day Holiday

This Monday, February 20, morning Mass will be at 9:00am, and the Parish Office will be closed in observance of the Presidents' Day holiday.

Anointing of the Sick

On the weekend of **March 4-5, the Second Sunday of Lent**, we will celebrate the *Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick* at all Saturday evening and Sunday Masses. This Sacrament is for those with acute or chronic illness, as well as for the elderly whose health is impaired by virtue of their age. The Sacrament is not celebrated with children under the age of reason (generally accepted as 7 years old). Even those who are not able to attend Mass regularly are encouraged to be with us on March 4 or 5. There will be seats reserved for those who are less ambulatory.

Tough Teachings

This Week's Readings at Mass

- ▶ Leviticus 19:1-2, 17-18 • Various rules of conduct
- ▶ 1 Corinthians 3:16-23 • The work of God's ministers
- ▶ Matthew 5:38-48 • New law of retaliation; love of enemies

It might seem like Jesus is telling his followers they should be “push-overs” with his instructions in the first half of this gospel passage. Turn the other cheek, hand over your cloak as well as your tunic, go the extra mile—they all seem passive in the face of injustice. In reality, Jesus’ listeners would have heard the radical call to show strength and courage with these particular responses. Each response would have publicly called out the offender.

To turn your cheek after being struck on the right cheek (which would be the slap given by a superior to someone inferior to him) would be to insist to the person hitting that you were their equal in dignity. If someone took your tunic, the only thing hiding your nakedness would be your cloak. To be naked in public was more shameful for the observer than the naked person in Jesus’ culture. Jesus knows that if you started to take off your cloak, the one who took your tunic would be quick to let you keep it. Roman soldiers were permitted to press people into service to carry their gear for a mile, but it was illegal for them to ask for more. Someone who cheerfully offered to go farther could then bring punishment on the soldier. In all these examples, Jesus finds a “third way” to respond to injustice. He doesn’t ask his disciples to accept it passively. He doesn’t permit violence in return. Instead, he calls for a response that upholds the dignity of the victim while giving pause to the offender.

The second half of the passage, with its teaching on loving your enemies, is challenging in itself. Some people may be fortunate enough to be in a place in life where they don’t feel that they have enemies. Jesus’ teaching to “love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you” might seem like a non-issue. Perhaps these lucky ones can bring greater love into the world by

spending energy on loving and and praying for their family’s, churches, or nations “enemies.”

Jesus knows that many of us *aren’t* in a place of feeling able to love our enemies. But he doesn’t let us off the hook here. Just because it’s hard doesn’t mean we shouldn’t aspire to it. If we want to be more God-like, we can work toward that, trusting that Jesus doesn’t judge us for having normal human emotions and reactions. It may take a long time, but there are plenty of examples of people who have arrived at a place of being able to love others who have hurt them terribly. In the meantime, perhaps the rest of us can at least pray to have the desire to pray for our enemies.

- 1 When have you seen or heard about a victim responding to violence or injustice in keeping with Jesus’ teaching as above? How did that affect you?
- 2 Have you ever had an experience of genuinely being able to love and pray for an enemy? What was that like? Please share.

“Sean santos, porque yo, el Señor, su Dios, soy santo” (Levítico 19:1).

“Sean ustedes perfectos como es perfecto el Padre que está en el Cielo.” (Mateo 5:48).

Estos dos pasajes tomados de las lecturas de este domingo nos recuerdan el desafío dado a todos los bautizados. Sin embargo, al escuchar esto, podemos decidir ni siquiera intentarlo, porque la tarea parece ser imposible. ¿Podemos realmente ser como Dios?

Nuestro catecismo, haciéndose eco de las palabras del Libro del Génesis, enseña que estamos hechos “a imagen y semejanza de Dios”. Si Dios, por lo tanto es santo y perfecto, también tenemos esa capacidad. Como hemos escuchado muchas veces, no podemos dejar que lo perfecto sea enemigo de lo bueno. Nos esforzamos hacia la santidad poco a poco, poco a poco, y no debemos desanimarnos si lleva mucho tiempo o incluso, a veces, parece imposible. Con Dios todo es posible, incluso, por la gracia de Dios, alcanzando la santidad que refleja la santidad de Dios.

A medida que nos acercamos a la temporada de Cuaresma, el período final de preparación para aquellos que serán bautizados o recibidos en la Iglesia, usamos estos próximos 40 días para redescubrir la vida del Bautismo que es nuestra. Esa es la razón por la cual la Pascua está tan llena de los símbolos del Bautismo, incluida la aspersión semanal con agua bautismal. Únase a nosotros el Miércoles de Ceniza al entrar en este tiempo de "retiro" para nosotros y todos los cristianos.

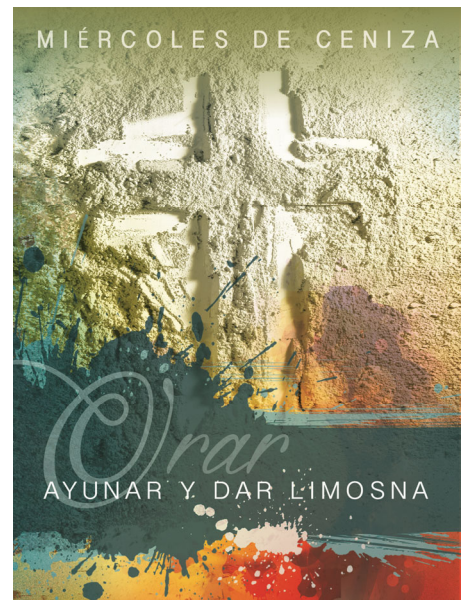
Horario del Miércoles de Ceniza

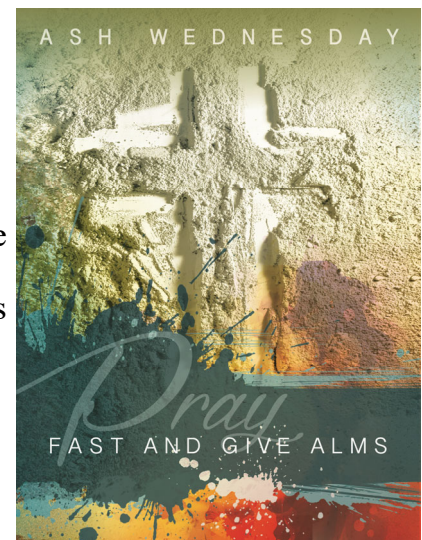
Se amas só quem te ama, que recompensa esperas ter?

PARISH COMMUNITY O evangelho deste VII domingo do tempo comum desafia-nos, desconcerta-nos e provoca-nos! É uma obrigação e um gosto amar quem nos ama. É um gesto que nos pode sair do coração reconhecer e agradecer a quem tanto bem nos faz! É natural que queiramos oferecer ou ter algum gesto para com quem nos dá tanto de si, do que é e do que tem. A gratidão e a humanidade passam por estes gestos. No entanto, num primeiro olhar, parece que o evangelho reprova todos os gestos de gratidão, de amor para com aqueles que nos amam, e expressam esse amor de modos tão diferenciados. No entanto, o evangelho não nos convida a mudar de direção mas a alargar os nossos horizontes na direção para onde caminhamos. Recorda-nos o Senhor: ‘também os pagãos são amigos dos seus amigos. No futuro Ele me dirá o que em cada fase me pede. Por amor, temos que ser distintos dos pagãos. No fim do meu dia, da semana, do mês, do ano, em que é que me tenho distinguido? O que Deus me poderá estar a querer dizer é que não mude de vida mas me converta. Não deixe de gostar de quem gosta de mim, mas gostar de quem de mim não gosta.
