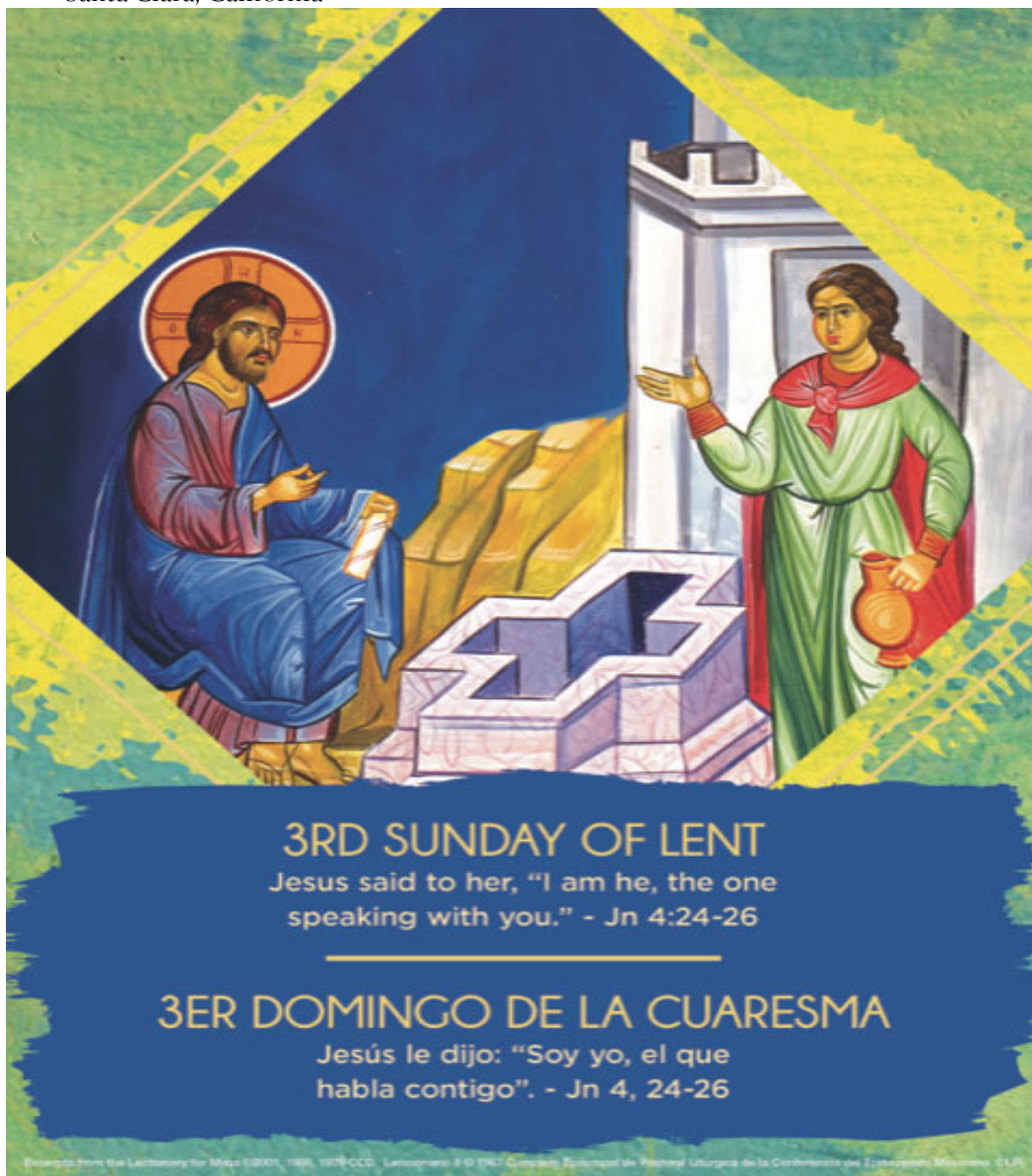

On the third, fourth and fifth Sundays of Lent, we celebrate Scrutinies with and for the Elect who are approaching the Easter Sacraments (Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist). The readings these Sundays focus on three baptismal themes: Living Water for the Samaritan woman at the well, Sight for the man who was born blind, and the Raising of Lazarus from the Dead, which was the last and greatest sign that Jesus performed before His Passion, Death and Resurrection.

While these readings are used for Masses with Scrutinies every year, this year (using the "Cycle A" readings), we hear them at all Sunday Masses. In fact, they are so important that parishes are allowed to use them on these three Sundays every year – at every Mass.

It is Jesus who is Living Water, Sight to the Blind and Life for the Dead. Even as we focus upon the journey of the Elect toward Baptism, we are given the opportunity to renew our own life in Christ, the life of the Baptism we already share. This is what we celebrate at Easter, as we renew our Baptismal promises and are sprinkled with Easter Water, the Paschal Candle leading us from darkness to light.

Bishop Cantú has granted a dispensation from Lenten Friday abstinence from meat this coming Friday, March 17, in honor of Saint Patrick's Day.

Weekly Justice Challenge

Justice Challenge: The Samaritan woman, also known as the woman at the well, is featured in Sunday's Gospel. She was a member of a tribe with which the Jews did not interact, she was a woman, and she had a fairly bad reputation after being married several times. Even with these three strikes against her, Jesus made her the first evangelizer of her village. Your challenge this week is to identify someone in your life who is not from your immediate circle of family and friends, someone you might consider an outsider, and listen to or closely observe that person. See if you can learn something about Jesus from the way he or she lives and speaks. Show appreciation for this "outsider" in any way you can.

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Creation Care Tips

As the climate continues to change, millions suffer from a lack of clean water for drinking, washing, and irrigating. Even if your community isn't suffering from drought or reduced supply, do something big or small to reduce your usage. If you have the means, the next time you buy a dishwasher or washing machine, purchase one that uses less water. Learn about capturing the gray water from your washing machine to use in your garden. Often the conversion is simple and inexpensive. Consider replacing your thirsty lawn with a drought tolerant landscape. On a smaller scale, cut back your shower time a few minutes.

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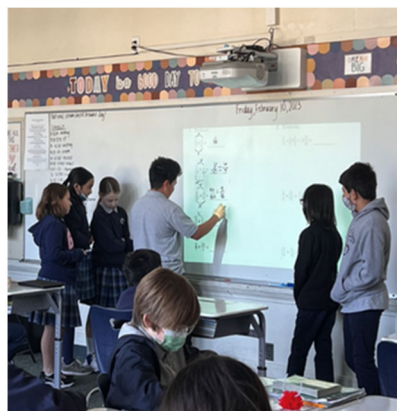


TEACHERS COLLABORATE

CATHOLIC WORKER

The Casa de Clara Catholic Worker (San Jose, CA) is looking for multiple new live-in intentional community members.

The Casa de Clara Catholic Worker(San Jose, CA) is an attempt to live in microcosm “a society where it is easier to be good”. For us, this means emphasizing our house as a community at all levels, the residents managing the width and breadth of their engagement in the house itself, in celebration.

The Casa de Clara house as a community: We offer supported, residential community in our 4-bedroom house with two bedrooms for folks who were living on the street, and we try to support households and parishes to offer hospitality spaces for Christ the stranger.

Celebrate: We make ourselves available to “the liturgical circulation of the cosmos” by participating in the liturgy of the hours, mass, lectio Divina with the daily Gospel, and attempting to celebrate the feasting, fasting, and resting rhythms of the Church’s calendar.

Minister to those in need: We strive to help our neighbors by assisting with food distribution, clothing distribution, a shower ministry that brings a mobile shower unit to the homeless encampments and other activities as our residents find our community is in need.

History: Casa de Clara was founded in the 1970’s and has provided services and a stable place for the Christian message, a promulgated by Dorothy Day and Peter Maurin, to be put into practice. We have provided housing, food, clothing and shelter for the less fortunate in the Silicon Valley, truly in the heart of wealth. We have a shower program that we bring to homeless encampments along with other services that we are anxious to get restarted. We have been engaged in pushing for social change in immigration, wealth disparity, homelessness and military madness. We are located at 318N. 6th Street, San Jose, CA.

In living these practices, we seek to live the found seeds of a small but encompassing way of life, “rooted and grounded in love,” yet , we believe, adequate to explore “the breadth and height, and length, and depth” of life in Christ (Eph 3:17-18).

Characteristics that would point to a potential fit:

- Desire to live in community supporting folks previously living on the streets
- Interest in continuing Catholic formation (liturgy, Scripture, catechism, i.e., shared framework and practices; not necessarily shared belief)
- Interest in living and developing Peter Maurin’s economic program, especially a cooperative, community-scale economy
- Orientation towards (radical) regrounding in the deeper sources of tradition
- Openness to a daily rhythm of prayer centered around Mass and the liturgy of the hours (either two or three daily prayer periods including Mass, at this point just weekdays)

Other things to note:

- We aren’t ideal for someone for whom political advocacy is the central form of moral expression
- Our community has a developing leadership structure that borrows from the Benedictine Rule as well as the anarchic side of the Catholic Worker
- We’re open to folks with or seeking part time work as well as those with full time availability.

A Brave Questioner

This Week's Readings at Mass

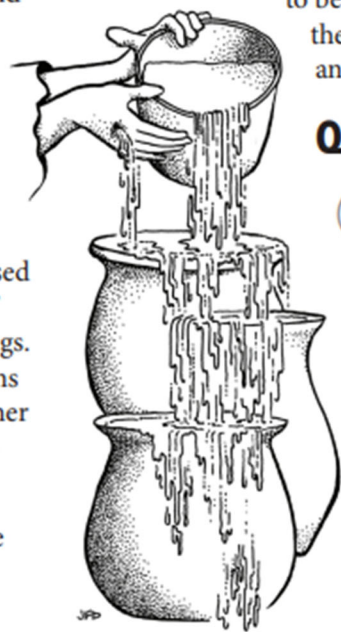
- ▶ Exodus 17:3-7 • Water from the rock
- ▶ Romans 5:1-2, 5-8 • Faith, hope, and love
- ▶ John 4:5-42 • The Samaritan woman at the well

So many biblical scenes take place in the desert and revolve around the question of where people will find the water and food they need to survive. It makes sense, given that our ancestors in faith lived in a region where finding their daily bread and water was literally a matter of life or death. The first reading today tells the famous story of God making the impossible possible, providing Moses and the Israelites with water from a rock just when they thought they might die in the wilderness.

The Gospel reading tells a story of a woman who was thirsty, but in a different way. She has access to H₂O at Jacob's well, but until she meets Jesus, she doesn't realize she is thirsting for more. She knows her religious and theological tradition well. She understands Jews and Samaritans don't share physical items in common. She knows the history of Jacob's well. She knows about the prophets in her religion. She knows her people's historical place of worship. She knows about the Messiah they are awaiting.

She seems proud of her religious heritage and isn't easily pushed over. She values it and won't let it go without good reason. On the other hand, she is open to new understandings and isn't so prideful that she remains inflexible when presented with someone new. In that way, she was unlike some others Jesus met during his ministry who refused to consider new interpretations of their scripture or religious teachings. When Jesus answered her questions to her satisfaction and addressed her doubts about who he was, she was swift to accept him as her savior.

Notice Jesus' willingness to engage her hard questions. Notice his pa-

tience in letting her gradually come to a new understanding. Notice the respect and freedom he gives her to have her own thoughts and opinions. Notice how he gets fed by his conversation with her. Notice his joy when she spreads the good news about him (just like he was asking his apostles to do!).

Rather than focusing on the woman's marital history, what changes if we focus on how Jesus relates to her, and what happens as a result? "Many more began to believe in him." All because she bravely asked the questions she had and listened well to Jesus' answers.

Questions of the Week

- 1 Who has challenged you on your religious beliefs and helped you come to a new understanding of them?
- 2 What do you think of Jesus and how he relates to the woman in this passage? Is this a Jesus you would want to meet?

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Dá-me de beber!

PARISH COMMUNITY O evangelho deste terceiro domingo da quaresma recorda-nos o encontro entre Jesus e a samaritana junto do poço de Jacob. De acordo com a cultura do tempo, seria pouco provável encontrar um judeu a falar com uma mulher em circunstâncias como esta. Menos provável ainda, um judeu falar com uma mulher samaritana uma vez que os judeus estavam de relações cortadas com os samaritanos. Jesus decide-se pelo não provável e dirige-se à samaritana da maneira mais natural: “Dá-me de beber”! A samaritana fica surpreendida que Jesus fale com ela. É muito forte e tocante acompanhar o diálogo entre Jesus e esta mulher em João capítulo 4. O diálogo e tudo o que se segue tem início com o gesto mais natural das nossas vidas: dar um copo de água a quem tem sede. Mas este gesto também se reveste do mais sagrado que possamos viver: a nossa entrada na família de Deus vem-nos pelas águas do batismo. Ao espanto da mulher, “como é que tu sendo Judeu me pedes de beber”, Jesus responde-lhe: “Se conhecesses o dom de Deus” isto é, o dom do batismo; o dom daquele que te pede água, tu é que lhe pedirias água viva! Neste momento, estamos perante um impasse: afinal quem é que tem sede, Jesus ou a mulher? Os dois têm sede! Jesus tem sede das sedes dos samaritanos. Jesus tem sede das nossas sedes. Ele tem sede que nos entendamos quando não nos dá-mos bem, como acontecia entre judeus e samaritanos. Jesus tem sede de justiça, de partilha, de amor, de carinho, de compreensão, de respeito, de alegria verdadeira. Jesus tem sede de que o dom de Deus seja conhecido, testemunhado e anunciado. Afinal, as sedes de Jesus, são as sedes daquela mulher que ia todos os dias ao poço e andava sempre cheia de sede. Uma mulher que já tinha tido vários maridos e não estava satisfeita com a vida. Afinal, Jesus pediu água natural a quem mais precisa de água sobrenatural. Jesus, junto ao poço, jorra água capaz de saciar as sedes mais profundas da nossa vida. Valeria a pena, a partir desta passagem, perguntar a Jesus quais são as minhas sedes. Mais ainda, ver à luz de Jesus onde é que tenho alimentado e saciado as sedes da minha vida interior. Jesus continua a ter sedes! As sedes de Jesus é que cada um de nós se sacie em fontes que encham o coração de vida. Vale a pena rezar isto!

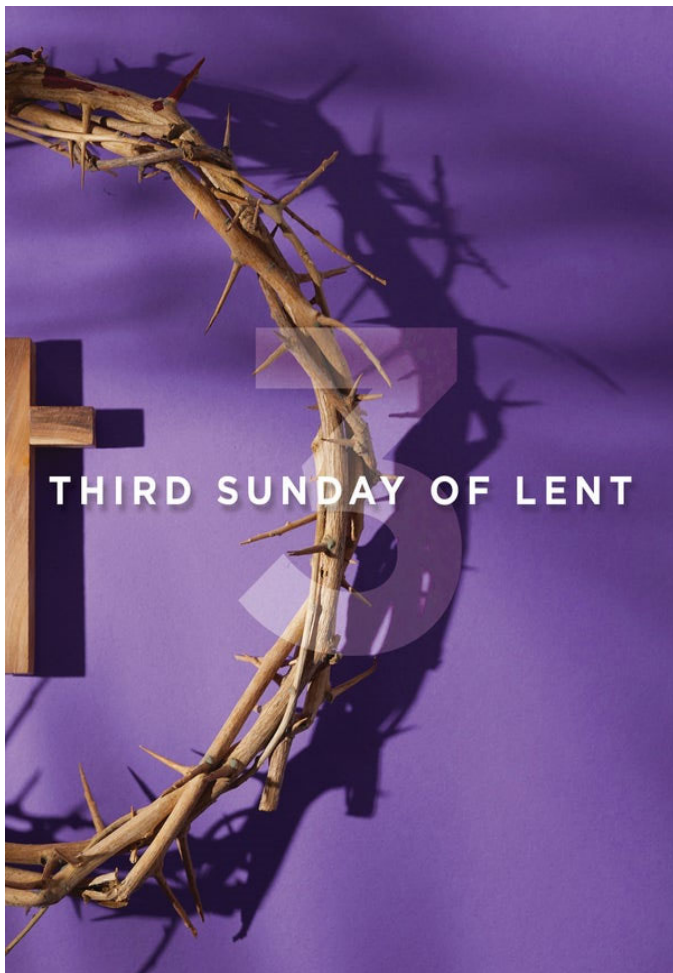
