Scholars divide the Gospel of Saint John into two parts: The Book of Signs (from John 1:18 until the end of chapter 12) and the Book of Glory (from chapter 13 until the end of the gospel). The raising of Lazarus from the dead is the seventh, last and greatest sign.

While the raising of Lazarus is a sign of Jesus' Resurrection, the two differ: Lazarus was dead beyond the point of no return, already the fourth day when Jesus arrived at the tomb. Jesus' restoration of his life was a resuscitation; eventually Lazarus would die again. Jesus' Resurrection was to a new and permanent life, a resurrection to glory. It is this that is promised to us, and for which we hope. It is the promise of our Baptism and the hope of eternal life.

This Saturday, at the 5:00 pm Mass, we celebrate the Third Scrutiny with the Elect who will be baptized at Easter. Jesus conquered sin and death, making the same possible for all who are baptized into Him. May these last weeks of Lent help our Elect prepare for Easter, and may the rest of us find in these days the opportunity to be renewed in our baptismal life.

Weekly Justice Challenge

Justice Challenge: The Gospel Sunday recounts the story of Jesus raising Lazarus from the dead. It is eloquent to read that Jesus wept when he saw how devastated Lazarus' friends and relatives were about his friend's death. Jesus showed such compassion and human emotion. The word compassion is from the Latin words *com* (meaning with) and *pati* (to suffer). Compassion, then, is suffering with others who are hurting. Your challenge this week is to show compassion to someone who is suffering. You might donate money to CRS or another organization helping hurting people. Or you might give a sandwich to a homeless person in your community. Whatever you do, remember that compassion means entering into that person's human condition, not with condescension, but with a genuine sense of walking with them in their experience.

We may be fearful about the direction things are going when we hear about species extinction, polluted waterways, or wildfires ravaging forests. This week, keep your eyes and ears open for stories and examples of the regenerative power of nature. Look for reminders of new life coming from what seems like death: a seed planted that will sprout, a cocoon that will bring forth a butterfly, or an egg that will crack for a bird to be hatched.

SAINT CLARE SCHOOL ACCREDITATION VISIT CONCLUDES WITH HIGH MARKS

Our school was recently visited by a team of educators from across the Bay Area to affirm and validate the excellent formation and programs offered at Saint Clare School. Mrs. Carol Grewal, Assistant Superintendent of Schools in the Archdiocese of San Francisco chaired the team, which included Mrs. Regina Worley from Saint Victor School, Mrs. Joanne Laus from Saint John the Baptist School, and Mrs. Lauren Auker from Stratford School.

The visit concluded with a presentation attended by the Faculty and Staff, Msgr. Fran, and the diocesan Accreditation Commissioner, Fabienne Esparza, highlighting the Visiting Committee's findings. It is with great pride and gratitude that I present excerpts from the Report of Findings that will give you a feel for how effectively the Visiting Committee found our program:

The Visiting Committee identified the following eight most significant accomplishments:

1. Saint Clare School's environment supports a faith-centered education in an atmosphere of love and respect.
2. Saint Clare School is dedicated to the gospel message of serving others and has a strong social justice program based on the seven tenets of Catholic Social Teaching.
3. Saint Clare School is blessed to have the support and active participation of the pastor, the parochial vicar, the parish youth minister and the parish catechetical coordinator.
4. Saint Clare School's faculty and staff are cohesive and committed to facilitating the high achievement of all students through updated curriculum, occupational therapy, Bill Wilson counselors, student learning plans, students success plans, multi-tiered systems of support, and co-curriculars including art and P.E.
5. Saint Clare School has a strong, positive principal who is committed to moving the school forward.
6. Saint Clare School has a strong, inclusive, and caring community where children and teachers look out for each other.
7. Saint Clare School has a robust system of support for all learners.

Saint Clare School has a good foundation of resources (human, instructional, physical, and financial) to sustain the school's program and carry out its purpose of high achievement for all students.

In addition, the Visiting Committee concluded their report with the following statement:

The Visiting Committee thoroughly enjoyed the visit to Saint Clare School. The Visiting Committee affirms and commends the faculty, staff, and shareholders for thoroughly representing the life of the school within their Self-Study document. Saint Clare School lives their mission, and it is evident that Catholic Identity is an integral part of the life of the school. The faculty and staff are dedicated to their ministry of Catholic education, and they are diligent in meeting the needs of their students. There is strong evidence of a robust sense of community. The Visiting Committee noted the professionalism and dedication of teachers that goes above and beyond to benefit student learning. The faculty and staff work in a collegial spirit of collaboration for all students – not just the students in their class. Every student is valued and recognized for their unique gifts in such a way that a bond of dignity and respect is created between teachers and students. The parents of the Saint Clare community are wholeheartedly dedicated to the success of the school.

This relationship can be summed up with the term “community” as all shareholders are there to support one another. Lázaro Voltou á vida

A família de Betânia (Lázaro e suas irmãs, Maria e Marta) fazem parte dos amigos próximos de Jesus. Jesus frequentava a sua casa onde se geravam bonitos convívios, partilhas e refeições. Na Igreja sempre houve a tradição de acolher na casa e coração das famílias os profetas de Deus. Os apóstolos viveram a experiência do acolhimento.

S. Paulo na pregação aos gentios é acolhido, apoiado e suportado por várias famílias e deste modo tornou-se mais fácil a sua dedicação ao anúncio da boa notícia.

Quando Jesus soube que o seu amigo Lázaro estava doente, o seu coração encheu-se de tristeza. No entanto, Jesus continuou a desempenhar o seu trabalho e a cumprir a sua missão no local onde se encontrava. No entanto, quando Jesus pôde, dirigiu-se a Betânia, mas já não chegou a tempo de se despedir do amigo. Lázaro tinha falecido. Entre as lamentações, tristeza, lágrimas e desolação, o ambiente era de tristeza! Marta dirige-se a Jesus e diz-lhe “Se tu cá estivesses meu irmão não teria morrido”. Marta, sem saber, está a proclamar algo essencial da nossa fé: “Quem está com Jesus e em Igreja não morre nunca”. Jesus responde a Marta recordando-lhe o dom da fé daqueles que vivem em Cristo e para Cristo. Marta não entende estas palavras mas faz o seu caminho. No meio daquela tristeza, Jesus manifesta uma das maiores verdades da nossa fé: Lázaro volta à vida. Não ressuscitou, voltou à vida e mais tarde morreu como qualquer ser humano a fim de ressuscitar com Cristo. Lázaro teve que morrer, tal como uma semente que se lança à terra, para ressuscitar com Jesus e para Jesus. Jesus poderia ter feito com que Lázaro não voltasse à vida. Fê-lo para que aquelas pessoas à volta do túmulo vissem e vendo acreditassesem. Jesus agiu deste modo para que aquelas pessoas não permanecessem com os olhos fixos no túmulo mas na vida que o túmulo não vence! Os olhos daquelas pessoas foram girando a começar no túmulo e acompanhando Lázaro vivo! Deixai-o ir, disse Jesus. E para onde foi Lazaro? Foi viver os anos que ainda tinha para viver afim de mais tarde morrer, ressuscitar e ser abraçado por Deus. Esta é a nossa condição e missão. Nasceremos para sempre mas temos que passar pela paixão e morte mas não ficaremos no túmulo. Que a fé nos inspire e ilumina a percebermos isto!

Esto es lo que se nos promete y lo que esperamos. Es la promesa de nuestro Bautismo y la esperanza de la vida eterna.

Este sábado, en la Misa de las 5:00 pm, celebramos el Tercer Escrutinio con los Elegidos que serán bautizados en Semana Santa. Jesús conquistó el pecado y la muerte, haciendo posible lo mismo para todos los que son bautizados en Él.
