Parish Mission Statement



Jesus took Peter, James, and John his brother, and led them up a high mountain by themselves. And he was transfigured before them; his face shone like the sun and his clothes became white as light (Matthew 17:1).

The Transfiguration of Jesus, which we recall each year on the second Sunday of Lent, gave the Lord courage and hope as he walked the road to the Crucifixion. He was – if only for a short time – as he would become after the Cross and Resurrection. Although they did not understand it at the time, Jesus' appearance in His glory would also give hope to the Apostles that their suffering and death, too, could be transformed into glory.

On this weekend during which we celebrate the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, we pray that those who are weakened by illness or age might also undergo a transformation. While the Sacrament does not make any promise or guarantee of physical healing, its pledge of the prayers of the Church for those who suffer a form of isolation due to infirmity and age can bring real and lasting healing in mind and spirit. Whether you will approach this "holy anointing" or not, your participation in our prayer is a sign of solidarity with those who suffer here and around the world.

Rites for the Elect Who Are Approaching Baptism The Scrutinies

On the Third, Fourth and Fifth Sundays of Lent, the Church celebrates rites that are called *Scrutinies*.


The Scrutinies are three special rites that help prepare the Elect, those participating in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA), to enter the Catholic Church. They take place during the period of RCIA formation known as the Period of Enlightenment, near the end of their formation, usually during the season of Lent, which involves a more intense period of examination and preparation for the Elect, and hopefully for those of us already living the Catholic faith. Though they are meant for the RCIA Elect, the Scrutinies can help all who are seeking to live a life of continuous conversion.

The purpose of the Scrutinies is "to uncover, then heal all that is weak, defective, or sinful" in the hearts of the Elect and to "strengthen all that is upright, strong, and good." (Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults, paragraph 141).

The First Scrutiny will be celebrated at the 5:00 Mass next Saturday evening. The Second Scrutiny (March 12) will be at the 10:30 am Mass and the Third Scrutiny will be at the 5:00 Mass on March 18.

Weekly Justice Challenge

Sometimes we think about making big plans for Lenten sacrificing, only to fall behind with work, family, and other responsibilities. We find ourselves in the Second Week of Lent with no



commitment to better prayer lives, doing good deeds, or practicing acts of self-denial. But it is never too late. Catholic Relief Services offers a great resource to parishes and families for praying, fasting and charitable giving—all in one simple project. What is so great about this project, known as Operation Rice Bowl (ORB), is that it makes all the right connections. When you put the money you would have spent on a CD or that mocha latte you crave into your Rice Bowl box, you participate in Jesus' sacrifice. CRS provides prayers to a accompany your giving. And it uses the money you would have spent on yourself to help people in need across the world. Participating in ORB is an act of solidarity—standing with your brothers and sisters as one human family. Your challenge this week is to adopt Operation Rice Bowl (go to CRSRiceBowl.org if you parish doesn't do ORB). Give up the extra energy drink, candy bar, movie, or trip to the mall. Put the money in your Rice Bowl, knowing it will be sent to CRS. You will be walking with Jesus while making a difference in the lives of others.

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Creation Care Tips



During the Lenten season, we traditionally focus on three aspects of our faith: prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Consider how these could be oriented toward care for creation. Pray for those impacted by

pollution, drought, and other negative impacts on the environment. Fast from some behaviors that contribute to these kinds of impacts. Give alms to an organization that works for the care of the environment or serves those in need because of environmental changes.

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Saint Clare School News

Serra Club and Deacon Eddie Visit the 8th Grade Classroom

Recently, Serra Club Chapter President and Saint Clare alumni parent and current grand-parent Bruce Newnan visited the 8th grade classroom with Deacon Eddie Nguyen, S.J., to speak to the students about the importance of Vocations. The students were invited to submit an entry to their annual essay contest. Serran members and Msgr. Fran will review the essays. The top three essay writers received awards, which were presented at the conclusion of the March 3rd school Mass.

Fourth Grade Mission Projects Build Research, Design-Thinking, and Presentation Skills

The fourth graders spent the whole month of January preparing for the California Mission Project. The students researched details (and many even took their families to visit!) about the 21 Missions that were founded in California over the course of the late 1700s. Students learned about how and why the missions were founded, the daily life at the Mission, and important events that impacted their Mission. Students worked hard on the following components of their projects:

- A three-paragraph essay that was written in class, where students researched and compiled facts about their assigned Mission
- A visual model of their choice, wherein most students built a traditional mission model, with a few students building their Missions on Minecraft!
- A presentation about their Mission and the creation of their projects

The students learned a great deal about California history and they took great pride in sharing their

braham was chosen by God to be the father of the Jewish race. To be born a Jew meant to be born a descendant of Abraham. It was only through their relationship with Abraham that the Chosen People shared in God's first covenant and promises. God told Abraham, "This is my covenant, which you shall keep, between me and you and your offspring after you...." (see Genesis 17:1-23).

Saint Paul begins his second letter to Timothy by recalling God's promise to give life to the whole human race through Jesus, according to the plan God made "before the ages began" (see 2 Timothy I: 1, 9). The grace, the favor of God is held out to us "in Christ Jesus." It is through our relationship with him that we share in God's New Covenant and its promises.

Jesus, however, did not have an impressive presence on earth while walking the roads of Galilee. He was an ordinary man, dressed in ordinary clothes, who traveled on foot and generally attracted the poor and un-

educated as followers. The large crowds that followed Jesus were usually small by our standards: small enough for Jesus to teach them while sitting down, without a microphone. Important people, like the Sanhedrin leader Nicodemus, were afraid to be seen with him. When a low-ranking Roman officer asked for a cure, Jesus was amazed. Mostly, he was a small-time preacher on a small-town circuit.

Today Jesus is still not that prominent. He does not have high visibility in most countries' national life. And when he does, in the person of the pope or Church dignitaries, it may be because they are using the same status symbols (private jets, motorcades, MARCH 5, 2023

clothing, protocol) that other political figures use. But in most of Jesus' ministry today—his quiet influence on family and social life, business and politics; the daily initiatives and decisions of all the members of his Body; his daily presence through everyone engaged in teaching, preaching and healing ministries—Jesus keeps a very low profile, so low that many people hardly notice his presence.

That is why God gave us the Transfiguration and why we celebrate this liturgy. Here, as on the mountain of the Transfiguration, God invites us to look at Jesus in his glory: to see his face shining like the sun, to hear the Father saying to us, "This is my Son, the Beloved...listen to him!" In the liturgy Jesus is recognized for what he truly is: the Good News, the Light of the world, the Lamb of

God who takes away the sins of the world, the Bread of Life. In the liturgy bread and wine, ordinary things, symbols of ourselves and of our ordinary lives, are given back to us transfigured, transformed into Eucharist, into the Bread of Life and our spiritual drink. The

God invites us
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host and the chalice are held up to us, lifted up as Jesus was on the cross, and a voice proclaims, "This is my body. This is the cup of my blood. Take this, all of you. Eat. Drink." And we adore.

After the Transfiguration, Jesus said to his disciples, "Tell no one about the vision until after the Son of Man has been raised from the dead." Now Jesus is risen. Now is the time to proclaim him to the world as what he is: the Savior, the Lord, the fulfillment of all God's promises, Abraham's descendant in whom "all the families of the earth shall be blessed."

It is time for us to focus our own hearts on the grace given to us in Christ Jesus, "who abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel." It is time to look, to see and to believe.

REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

Second Week of Lent

Pray daily: God our Father, help us to hear your Son. Enlighten us with your word, that we may find the way to your glory. Grant us this through Christ, our Lord. Amen.

Monday: Luke 6:36-38. "Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful." The expression "be merciful" means to come to the aid of another out of a sense of relationship. On the basis of Jesus' teaching, can you see every person as God the Father does and treat every person as a brother or sister? How will doing this change your life?

Tuesday: Matthew 23:1-12. "The greatest among you will be your servant." Can you serve everyone, wherever you are, whatever you are doing? What are you seeking in your work, social and family life, civic involvement or participation in your parish? Is it service?

Wednesday: Matthew 20:17-28. "...[T]he Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life a ransom for many." How is Jesus serving you now? [n

what ways are others sacrificing themselves for you? How are you responding?

Thursday: Luke 16:19-31. "And at his gate lay a poor man named Lazarus, covered with sores, who longed to satisfy his hunger with what fell from the rich man's table." Who would gladly receive from you a "scrap" of notice or attention, a smile, a thoughtful act or some help you can give? Whom do you know who is "covered with sores" wounded by life experiences? How can you help?

Friday: Matthew 21:33-43, 45-46. "Have you never read in the scriptures: 'The stone that the builders rejected / has become the cornerstone;/ this was the Lord's doing,/ and it is amazing in our eyes'?" Is Jesus the cornerstone of your life, the key to everything you think, say and do? Have you rejected him in favor of building your life around something else, some other goal, value, program or attitude? If you stopped believing in Jesus, tomorrow, what concrete things would you change in your life-style?

Saturday: Luke 15:1-3, 11-32. "But we had to celebrate and rejoice, because this brother of yours was dead and has come to life; he was lost and has been found." When people sin against you, insulting or treating you unjustly, is your first reaction to defend yourself? To get even? Or do you pray that they will be converted and "come to life"?

SEVERAL SUGGESTIONS FOR LENT

Prayer: Put the Bible on your pillow. Read one line before going to sleep each night and again on waking up.

Fasting: Pick one activity of your day that you enjoy. Decide not to satisfy yourself by doing that until you have done something kind for someone else.

Almsgiving: Each time someone (including God!) is nice to you or does you a favor, do something right away for someone else.

Domingo II da Quaresma – A Reflexão pelo Padre Francisco Rodrigues S.J.

No Monte da Transfiguração as portas do céu abriram-se!

PARISH COMMUNITY O evangelho deste segundo domingo do tempo quaresmal abre-nos as portas do céu! Ainda na fase inicial deste tempo quaresmal, a Igreja

recorda-nos, através do evangelho deste domingo, que a quaresma não é um fim em si mesmo, mas um meio para chegar à meta que é Jesus e Jesus ressuscitado.

Os discípulos de Jesus são convidados a subirem ao Monte Santo onde Jesus se transfigura. No monte, durante a transfiguração, os discípulos não precisam de fé. Eles experimentam em primeira pessoa a divindade de Jesus. Sentem-se resplandecentes pelo brilho que inunda as suas almas. Como é bom estamos aqui, diz Pedro a Jesus. Que bom que seria se cada um de nós dissesse a Jesus: "Jesus, como é bom estar contigo". A experiência de estar com Jesus é tão intensa e consoladora que chegam a dizer a Jesus: façamos aqui três tendas e permaneçamos aqui! No entanto, Jesus recordar-lhes dois pontos: não dizerem a ninguém o que experimentaram. Isto porque, é preciso que os acontecimentos não sejam antecipados e a busca de cada um na relação com Jesus seja vivida em liberdade. Segundo ponto, a missão não é vivida no conforto mas na verdade do dia-a-dia. Pode parecer bom viver no quentinho, mas Jesus quer-nos a viver na vida concreta do nosso quotidiano. Jesus oferece bocadinhos do céu, mas quer-nos a viver a sua mensagem no trabalho, na família, nas Irmandades, na comunidade, e por ai fora. O tempo quaresmal é um período propício a reconhecer as nuvens que pairam no céu da nossa vida mas a não ficar nelas. Nesta vivência nublada, eis que aparece um raio de sol através da transfiguração. Fixados nos raios de luz que nos trazem Jesus, somos convidados a olharmos para todos os que estão sujeitos às nuvens negras da existência, quer vivam longe quer vivam perto, e sermos nós mesmos portadores dos raios de luz que lhes leva Jesus. Que nas vias-sacras do nosso tempo quaresmal, possamos identificar Jesus que hoje continua a sofrer, tal como há dois mil anos, em tantas pessoas que carregam as suas cruzes. Que o evangelho deste domingo dedicado à transfiguração ilumine a nossa ação tantas vezes envolta em nuvens. Nós sabemos que as nuvens não duram para sempre. Depois destas, virá a luz sem ocaso, isto é, a luz que é Jesus e que nunca mais terá fim!

Ritos Para Los Elegidos Que Se Acercan Al Bautismo Los Escrutinios

En el tercero, cuarto y quinto domingo de Cuaresma, la Iglesia celebra ritos que se llaman *Escrutinios*.



Los Escrutinios son tres ritos especiales que ayudan a preparar a los Elegidos, aquellos que participan en el Rito de Iniciación Cristiana de Adultos (RICA), para ingresar a la Iglesia Católica. Se llevan a cabo durante el período de formación de RICA conocido como el Período de Iluminación, cerca del final de su formación, generalmente durante la temporada de Cuaresma, que implica un período más intenso de examen y preparación para los Elegidos y, con suerte, para aquellos de nosotros que ya vivimos la

fe católica. Aunque están destinados a los elegidos de RICA, los Escrutinios pueden ayudar a todos los que buscan vivir una vida de conversión continua.


