A hymn comes to mind, in the original Spanish:

*Por la calzada de Emaús
un peregrino iba conmigo.
No le conocí al caminar;
ahora sí, en la fracción del pan.*

[Along the road to Emmaus
a pilgrim was with me.
I did not know him when walking;
now yes, in the breaking of the bread.]

The proverbial “Road to Emmaus” is the age-old story of disciples encountering the Lord who walks with them along the paths of their lives. It also presents the pattern of our worship: breaking open the Scriptures and the Breaking of the Bread. It is through the latter that the former makes sense, as recounted in the gospel account: “Were not our hearts burning within us while he spoke to us on the way and opened the Scriptures to us?” and “And it happened that, while he was with them at table, he took bread, said the blessing, broke it, and gave it to them. With that their eyes were opened and they recognized him, but he vanished from their sight.”

Jesus does not wait for us to call upon Him or for us to go where we expect Him to be (as in the church). He finds us and walks with us, present to us especially in our time of need.

The Risen Lord continues to be present to us. We need to attune ourselves to recognize Him in the Scriptures, the Eucharist and at every moment of our lives.

New Parish Office Hours

We are in the process of increasing the number of hours our Parish Office will be open. Beginning on Monday, May 1, we will be open from Monday through Friday, from 9:00 am to 4:00pm with the exception of Wednesday hours will be 9:00am to 12pm. In addition, the Diocese has 40 priests reaching retirement age, 70 years old, in the next 15 years and 9 in just the next five years (including Msgr. Fran).

For the last two years, Saint Clare has been extremely generous in this appeal, a generosity for which your parish priests are most grateful.

Weekly Justice Challenge

Justice Challenge: Today's Gospel recounts the Emmaus journey of the two disciples. They recognized the resurrected Christ only when he broke bread with them. Saint Damien of Molokai, whose feast day is May 10, is well known for breaking bread with lepers. Your challenge this week is to reflect on the people who need you to break bread with them. Is it the people who come to the local Catholic Worker House for lunch or the homeless shelter? Is it the young person sitting alone in the cafeteria at school? Spend some time searching your heart and your community to see who needs you to be bread in their lives. Then break bread with someone new this week, and discover the face of Christ when you do so.

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Creation Care Tips

“Now on that same day, two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, and talking with each other about all these things that had happened.” —Luke 24:13-14

It seems the disciples thought nothing of walking seven miles in a day to get to their destination. Besides saving gas, what do you notice around you that you might have missed otherwise because you have to slow down?

Risen—"So What?"

The most reverent response we can make to the good news of Jesus' Resurrection is "So what?" Asking this question sincerely shows we are taking the Good News seriously, considering how we should respond to it in action through choices which restructure our lives.

Some scholars think that 1 Peter 1:3—2:10 quotes an earlier baptismal ritual. In fact, it describes clearly and powerfully how a life based on Baptism should be restructured. Through Christ we believe in a God who raised Jesus from the dead, will raise us from the dead and has already shared with us the divine life. Because of this faith all our attitudes and values rest on a new foundation. Our whole perception of this world is different: We see everything in the light of the new meaning that Christ's Resurrection has given to our lives. All our desires have a new focus. As Peter puts it, we have been delivered from the "futile ways" our culture hands down to us. Now all that we believe in and value, all our faith and all our hope for fulfillment, are "set on God." The life we live begins and ends in God.

Peter first explains the faith to nonbelievers by proclaiming Resurrection and new life through the gift of the Holy Spirit. Because of this we can sing with the psalmist, "[B]ecause [the Lord] is at my right hand, I shall not be moved /...my body also rests secure. / For you do not give me up to Sheol, ...You show me the path of life" (Psalm 16:10). The path we follow is not the way of life our culture invites us to live; that life looks no further than the grave. Think about it. In our society everything—education, business, politics, social life—is organized around a single goal: finding fulfill-

ment in a life that stops cold at death. Neither God nor grace is in the picture.

A new hope, based on faith in Resurrection, characterizes and shapes an authentically Christian life here on earth. Hope involves two things: hope for and hope in. We hope for those things we desire. We hope in whatever or whomever we trust to make them achievable.

Hope is a free choice. We hope for those things we choose to desire. We might feel desire for all sorts of things, but we only hope for those things on which we freely focus our desire. Although we might wish to lose weight, this becomes a hope only when we adopt it as a goal. In the same way, although we might want to be happy forever with God after death, this only becomes a hope when we organize our lives around it. The virtue of hope which we received at Baptism (along with faith and love) is the gift of being able not just to believe in, but also to accept personally the fulfillment which Jesus holds out as the practical, guiding goal of our lives.

We can set our hopes only on what we believe is achievable. That is why hope also means trust. And trust

is also a free choice. Even when something seems clearly possible, we must choose to trust the evidence before we can try to achieve the goal. When something seems obviously impossible—such as life after death—we cannot hope for it or choose it as a goal unless we trust that something will make it possible. Our hope for life with God after death is based on our trust in the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

That is why we need liturgy, specifically the Eucharistic celebration. The disciples on the road to Emmaus who had hoped in Jesus but were hoping no longer, who doubted the reports that Jesus had risen from the dead, only came to know him “in the breaking of the bread.” In every Mass we celebrate and proclaim through word and sacrament the reality of Christ’s death and Resurrection. By expressing our hope together, we grow in it together. In liturgy we give life and receive it.

REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK’S GOSPELS

Third Week of Easter

Pray daily: God our Father, may we look forward with hope to our resurrection, for you have made us your sons and daughters and restored the joy of our youth. Amen.

Monday: John 6:22-29. “Do not work for the food that perishes, but for the food that endures for eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you.” What motivates you to get up in the morning? What motivated Jesus? What motivated the apostles after the Resurrection?

Tuesday: John 6:30-35. Jesus said, “I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry.” What hunger of yours has Jesus satisfied? What else could he satisfy? How?

Wednesday: John 6:35-40. “And this is the will of my Father, that all who see the Son and believe in him may have eternal life.” What does this tell me about God as Creator? As Father? As One I can trust? As One who loves me?

Thursday: John 6:44-51. “It is written in the prophets: ‘And they shall all be taught by God.’ Everyone who has heard and learned from the Father comes to me.” How does God teach you? How can you “hear the Father”? What draws you to Jesus?

Friday: John 6:52-59. “Just as the living Father sent me, and I live because of the Father, so whoever eats me will live because of me.” How did the Father’s life appear in Jesus? What did it empower him to do? How does Jesus’ life reveal itself in your words and actions?

Saturday: John 6:60-69. “Lord, to whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life.” To whom do you turn for help, guidance, comfort in life? Can you find these in the words of Jesus?

LIVING THIS WEEK’S GOSPELS

As Christian: Ask in detail how in everything you do each day you can be part of God’s work. Plan how to use reminders throughout the day. For example, symbols, phone beeps, association with other actions, like opening a door or starting your car.

As Disciple: Read a passage of Scripture every day, looking to see how these words are “words of eternal life.”

As Prophet: Decide on some specific action or choice which will show (to those who have eyes to see) that in each area of your life (work, recreation and so on) you are looking for more than this life can give.

As Priest: Ask who in particular can have life because of you. Decide what you can do to share your faith, hope, love with that person in a life-giving way.

As King: Start pinpointing the goals held up to you by others at work, in your social life, when you watch TV, by those who sell you things. How can you help everything you are involved in more toward the goal of establishing Christ’s reign on earth?

Reconheceram-No ao partir do pão

O evangelho deste terceiro domingo do tempo Pascal recorda-nos a passagem dos discípulos de Emaús. Esta passagem representa a nossa vida concreta na sua complexidade de vivências, ânimos, desânimos, expectativas, esperanças e frustrações. Os discípulos regressavam de Jerusalém, desanimados. Tinham vivido com Jesus. Tinham-lhe oferecido as suas vidas. Esperavam a grande promessa. No entanto, como eles próprios dizem: já lá vai o terceiro dia e nada! A esperança sabe esperar. O desânimo sabe dramatizar. Se eles não estivessem tão desanimados, teriam caído na conta e saberiam que estavam dentro do calendário da esperança, isto é, estavam no terceiro dia. O dia mais bonito da história. Mas como estavam desanimados, a tristeza apoderou-se deles e esta tentou minar-lhes a esperança. Quando eles iam a caminho de Emaús, Jesus faz-se companhia e companheiro. Coloca-os a falar e recorda-lhes as escrituras. Que linda liturgia da palavra. Esta liturgia, leituras e explicação, veio dar lugar à fração do pão, isto é à eucaristia. Na Quinta-Feira Santa Jesus celebrou a última ceia, a instituição da eucaristia. A caminho de Emaús, após a Ressurreição, Jesus celebra a primeira eucaristia. Os discípulos de Emaús reconhecem-no na fração do pão. Ao reconhecê-lo as suas vidas mudam de direção. Eles já não vão para Emaús, já não vão para casa desanimados, mas regressam a Jerusalém e não querem outra coisa que não seja falar da boa notícia. Na partilha de fé que vivem, recordam que antes, apesar do desânimo, os seus corações ardiam enquanto Jesus falava das escrituras. Há certos momentos da vida em que andamos mais desanimados, no entanto, se estamos com Deus, o nosso coração não está vazio. O coração arde sem se consumir. Este coração, animado ou não, mas ardente de amor e desejo de possuir Deus leva-nos à Eucaristia. Os discípulos saíram da missa transformados. Reconheceram o Senhor ao partir do pão. E no Senhor, reconheceram-se uns aos outros. E eu, como vivo a Eucaristia? Entro com o coração a arder e reconheço-o na consagração? Se entro marcado pelo desânimo, saio cheio de entusiasmo? Saio da missa com o desejo que a minha vida fale d'Ele? Que a Missa vivida pelos Discípulos de Emaús e com Jesus nos ajude a preparar e melhor viver as nossas celebrações eucarísticas e a reconhecê-Lo sempre ao partir do pão.

Youth Ministry

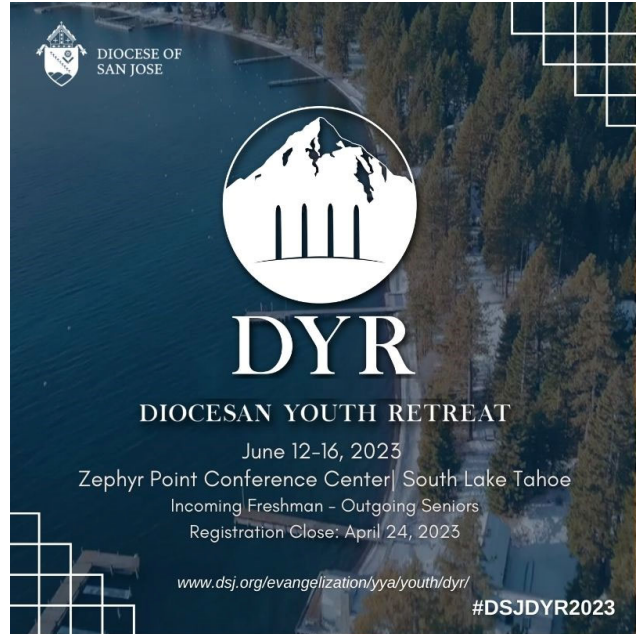
