

Three times in as many sentences, this Sunday's reading from the Prophet Jeremiah (33:14-16) mentions the future. Three times, the prophet offers hope to God's chosen people, who were in exile, far from their homeland and their temple, the center of religious practice.


"The days [that] are coming" speak to the people of God's abiding presence, even during the disastrous time of the "Babylonian Captivity." When "the Lord, our justice" appears, the people will again be safe and secure.

On the First Sunday of Advent, we, too, join the prophet in looking toward the future coming of the Lord, even as we prepare to celebrate His birth in Bethlehem more than 2000 years ago. At the very same time, we find hope and consolation that the same Lord is present among us, here and now, wherever we are.

The scripture readings throughout this season call us to this "joyful hope as we await the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ." May these weeks help to open to God's own life within us and renew us in the same love that gave us our Savior.


Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary Monday, December 9

Blessing and Lighting of Parish "Christmas Tree"



Boletim Paroquial Português 1 de Dezembro de 2024; Domingo I do Advento -C Reflexão Por: João Pereira Arruda

Este é o primeiro Domingo do novo ano litúrgico da ciclo C. S. Lucas nos oferecerá evangelhos com lições de vida recta e sábia para levar-mos as nossas vidas saudavelmente em espírito e verdade. Uma vez mais a nossa Igreja prepara-nos um tempo de quatro semanas para preparar-mos os nossos corações para receber um Menino Deus, o Emanuel, Príncipe da paz, esperança da salvação da Humanidade. O Salmo (24-25) Responsorial deste Domingo oferece-nos tudo o que a Humanidade esperava com a vindo de Messias. “ **O Senhor é bom e recto, ensina o caminho aos pecadores. Orienta os humildes na justiça e dá-lhes a conhecer os seus caminhos.**” Mais tarde João Baptista vira neste Tempo do Advento preparar esses caminhos do Senhor e endireitar essas veredas e ser guia de nossos caminhar por atalhos. Tanto Jeremias na Primeira Leitura nos fala do fim dos tempos e dos sinais que nos alertam da sua proximidade e desde muito tempo que esses mesmos sinais que vemos hoje via-se nas guerras que iam acontecendo por toda a parte, dos sinais do aquecimento global, dos furacões e de dilúvios. Esses sinais estão aqui e agora no meio de nós: guerras iniciadas pelo maligno nos corações dos poderosos chefes de nações que subjugam os mais fracos, os pobres, precisamente os mesmos que também neste Advento gostariam que o Menino Deus viesse lhes visitar em vez de ser bomrdeamento de bombas que destroiem as famílias com os seus parques haveres. Este ano para mais descalabro toda essa chacina está a acontecer na Terra Santa, nas proximidades em que o Menino Deus se fez homem pelo sim poderoso de Maria. Imaginam a Nossa Mãe e Mãe de Deus em Jesus Cristo observando seus filhos morrerem, vidas destruídas pela insensibilidade de uns poucos que vêem no ser humano em desigualdade de vida ser e estar a serem um peso, um estorvo, para os planos, de riqueza, interesses de poderio planos do diabo e não de Deus. Neste Advento, tempo de preparação e de penitência para receber o Salvados, peçamos ao Senhor que nos alimente as nossas mentes, os nossos espíritos em não pactuarmos com este movimento de exterminação de capital humano. Mesmo que posicionalmente estejamos numa maioria esta é a que está do lado de Deus. Sunday, December 1, 2024

Vigilance Requires Intentional Action

Today's readings: Jeremiah 33:14–16; Psalm 25:4–5, 8–9, 10, 14 (1b); 1 Thessalonians 3:12–4:2; Luke 21:25–28, 34–36. In the first reading, Jeremiah recalls the promise the Lord made to the Israelites regarding safety and security. Through his prophecy of restoration, Jeremiah calls the Israelites back to the Lord. Hearing this prophecy reminds us that comfort in the Lord is near!

At the beginning of the liturgical year, Advent encourages Christians to focus on keeping the Lord's "covenant and his decrees," as the psalm states. Much like the Israelites, we need to pray for prudence to recognize distractions in our daily lives. During this hectic season, we may feel pulled in many directions, often away from God, as it is a time filled with much busyness and movement—or "the anxieties of daily life." Amid these distractions, we are to remember that vigilance requires intentional action. In the Gospel of Luke, Jesus tells his disciples, "Beware that your hearts do not become drowsy." If attention is not paid, a person could be caught by surprise on the day of redemption. Keeping the Lord's covenant and his decrees requires spiritual discipline.

As this season of anticipation begins, the Advent wreath is blessed and lighted. Let us dedicate ourselves to lifting our souls to the Lord as we light a new candle each week.

Faith and Racial Justice: Changing Systems and Structures

JustFaith Ministries offers an eight-session program in which we will learn about key obstacles to racial justice that are embedded within our institutions, systems, and structures. Racist systems and structures are inextricably bound with the problem of hunger and malnutrition. This program begins with a Racial Wealth Gap Simulation created by *Bread for the World* and NETWORK, a lobby for Catholic Social Justice, to help communities get to the heart of the problem. As we participate in this simulation, we not only acquaint ourselves with the big ideas, but are introduced to a tool we can bring to our own churches and communities.



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, December 2 Healing Words

The centurion who approaches Jesus as he enters Capernaum expresses faith in the restorative power of Jesus' word: "Only say the word and my servant will be healed." Recognizing our unworthiness, we pray similar words during the Liturgy of the Eucharist. This week, consider how you might be like the centurion and faithfully ask for healing. Allow the Lord's words to provide comfort and flow over you so that you can go rejoicing. *Today's readings: Isaiah 2:1-5; Psalm 122:1-2, 3-4b, 4cd-5, 6-7, 8-9; Matthew 8:5-11.*

Tuesday, December 3 St. Francis Xavier

St. Francis Xavier was a cofounder of the Society of Jesus, also known as the Jesuit order. As the first Jesuit missionary, he spent much time traveling and living in foreign places to evangelize. His ministry required his learning new languages, being flexible with movement, and living in different cultures. Ask for St. Francis Xavier's intercession as you consider how you might challenge yourself to leave your comfort zone to preach the Good News. *Today's readings: Isaiah 11:1-10; Psalm 72:1-2, 7-8, 12-13, 17; Luke 10:21-24.*

Wednesday, December 4 Abundance

Today's Scriptures portray God's bountiful love for his people. First, the reading from Isaiah proclaims that the Lord "will provide for all peoples." Then Matthew's Gospel recounts how Jesus fed the crowd who had been with him for days with "nothing to eat." After Jesus gave thanks and broke the bread, thousands were offered food—and still there were leftovers! Reflect on the blessings in your life. Say a prayer in gratitude for the abundance—whatever that may be—with which the Lord has blessed you. *Today's readings: Isaiah 25:6-10a; Psalm 23:1-3a, 3b-4, 5, 6; Matthew 15:29-37.*

Thursday, December 5 Sturdy Ground

The Gospel reading portrays the importance of both listening intently and intentionally responding to the Lord. Consider ways to listen and respond to God throughout the rest of this season. How can you "be like a wise man who built his house on rock"? What are some tangible ways in which you are being encouraged to act so that your faith stands on sturdy ground? *Today's readings: Isaiah 26:1-6; Psalm 118:1 and 8-9, 19-21, 25-27a; Matthew 7:21, 24-27.*

Friday, December 6 St. Nicholas

It is easy to become consumed with shopping for gifts and preparing for many holiday parties as Christmas approaches, ultimately pushing aside our dedication to God. When losing focus on what matters, allow to echo within you today's psalm refrain: "The Lord is my light and my salvation." Recognizing this transformational prayer, celebrate the optional Memorial of St. Nicholas today with the gift of an act of service for someone. *Today's readings: Isaiah 29:17-24; Psalm 27:1, 4, 13-14; Matthew 9:27-31.*

Saturday, December 7 An Abundant Harvest

That Jesus' heart was moved with pity for the troubled and abandoned can comfort us today. Matthew's Gospel portrays Jesus' ministering to those who seemed like "sheep without a shepherd" and delegating his disciples to do the same. The reading from Isaiah shows that the Lord gives what is needed, answering his people "as soon as he hears" their cries. Let us find peace knowing that God is with us as we receive and, in turn, as we give. *Today's readings: Isaiah 30:19-21, 23-26; Psalm 147:1-2, 3-4, 5-6; Matthew 9:35-10:1, 5a, 6-8.*

Jer 33:14-16 | 1 Thes 3:12-4:2 | Lk 21:25-28, 34-36

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Are you one of those people who flips to the end of the book to find out what happens or maybe you roam the internet for spoilers of your favorite show? We have all been tempted to know what is going to happen before whatever it is unfolds, especially in tension-filled situations. Knowing the ending changes the way we experience the angst of the present moment, especially if it's a great ending! Like today: even as we anticipate and know the comfort and joy of the Advent season, we certainly do not begin there with our Gospel reading from Luke. In it, Jesus describes the coming of the Son of Man: this time will include moments of dismay, tribulation, assault, fright, and death. Contemplating this time of justice can be fearsome, but it is also a source of joy, because Christ is coming! We know that through Christ we have been redeemed – and that, if we remain faithful to him, we have the hope of eternal life. As Luke tells us, we can stand with our heads held high because redemption is at hand. Our Advent does not start with comfort and joy, but it sure ends there. Knowing this ending helps us have confidence and hope in God.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

We are encouraged and challenged by the Word and our Advent traditions this first week to *remember how it ends!* In our first reading, the prophet Jeremiah relays consolation to the nation in crisis when God tells them the days are coming when the Lord will “fulfill the promise.” This will bring them much-hoped-for safety and security. In Luke’s Gospel, Christ’s coming will be with “power and great glory” and although it sounds somewhat frightening, it will usher in redemption. Those are some spoilers providing great confidence and hope. In addition to our readings, the lighting of our first candle this Advent season is a visual reminder of the culmination of our salvation story! The Light who has come into the world has and will dispel the darkness. We can stand erect and raise our heads together to glimpse this light of Advent and fill our hearts again with hope that God surely is the one who keeps his promises. That is the best spoiler of all.

Tres veces en otras tantas frases, la lectura de este domingo del profeta Jeremías (33:14-16) menciona el futuro. Tres veces, el profeta ofrece esperanza al pueblo elegido de Dios, que estaba en el exilio, lejos de su patria y de su templo, el centro de la práctica religiosa.



En el primer domingo de Adviento, también nosotros nos unimos al profeta en la mirada hacia la futura venida del Señor, incluso mientras nos preparamos para celebrar su nacimiento en Belén hace más de 2000 años.
