

“The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph,” as this Sunday’s feast is known, is a celebration of the human relationships that bind together the family of Nazareth; it also honors the relationships that bind us to whatever families we belong.

As I have shared previously, there is no such thing as a “perfect” family. Even the Holy Family struggled in its own way, as seen in this weekend’s gospel account, in which Jesus was found by Joseph and Mary as He was preaching in the temple. That He had to “be about His Father’s business” did not diminish the anxiety that they felt when they realized that Jesus had not been in the caravan for a number of days. Although the Son of God, Jesus “came to Nazareth and was obedient to them.”

In spite of the dysfunctions and struggles our families sometimes experience, we are also called to the holiness that is the living out of our Baptism, as encouraged by Saint Paul in his letter to the Colossians: “. . . heartfelt compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience, bearing with one another and forgiving one another, if one has a grievance against another; as the Lord has forgiven you, so must you also do. And over all these put on love, that is, the bond of perfection.

In this, the Holy Family can be our helper and our guide.



Masses for New Year's Day - January 1, 2025 The Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God

On Wednesday, New Year's Day, we will follow a reduced schedule of Masses:
9:00 am in Portuguese, 10:30 am in English and 12:00 Noon in Spanish.

There will be no vigil Mass on New Year's Eve. This day remains a Holy Day of Obligation; we hope that all who are able will participate in one of our liturgies on what is also the annual World Day of Prayer for Peace. God knows, there is a shortage of peace in our world. Let us join together, praying for the peace that comes from the Lord as we honor Mary in her most ancient title, “Mother of God.”

The parish office remains closed until Thursday, January 2. Thank you for your understanding.

Jubilee Year 2025

What is a Jubilee Year? A Jubilee is a special year of prayer. Jubilees are times for forgiveness, reconciliation, and pilgrimage and are a part of the Catholic tradition. Jubilees ordinarily take place every twenty-five years.

During the Jubilee Year 2025, Pope Francis is calling on all the faithful to become Pilgrims of Hope. The Jubilee Year begins when Pope Francis opens the Holy Doors at Saint Peter’s Basilica on December 24, 2024. The doors will remain open until the end of the Jubilee Year on January 6, 2026. During the Jubilee, the faithful are encouraged to participate, either by going on pilgrimage to Rome or locations in our diocese to be announced. See the flyer on page 8.

Houve tempos, (Séculos) que as famílias eram constituídas pelo pai, a mãe e os filhos. Era o que se entendia por família e que nos nossos dias entendemos por família nuclear. Deus no Seu plano de Salvação para a Humanidade; fez com que, o seu Filho nascesse de Maria que estava prometida a José em casamento e com a intervenção do Espírito Santo o Seu Plano de Salvação se materializou e no processo a Humanidade foi resgatada, foi justificada perante o Pai,, foi salva. Nas últimas décadas os sociólogos, muito em particular do hemisférico do Oeste pretendem convencer as populações de que a família do plano de Deus não é perfeita, tem falhas e por assim ser “vendem” esta ideia que casais do mesmo sexo podem também fazer crescer em amor os filhos adoptados ou adquiridos por meios artificiais ou sem ser do modo natural trazido desde os tempos da criação do mundo.é sem dúvida simplesmente uma ideia presuposta sem ter em conta a felicidade dos filhos. Quando nos nossos dias se fala de violência doméstica. Quando encontraram Jesus no Templo, Maria na sua preocupação expressou essa a Jesus dizendo: “Filho porque procedeste assim connosco? Teu pai e eu andavamos aflitos á tua procura.” A resposta de Jesus já dava uma ideia do que seria a missão de Jesus quando adulto. Já deu indicações que tinha uma missão explícita e que esta implicava em os pais terem mais preocupações, mais aflições; assim foi Maria com Jesus até à sua morte de cruz. Os verdadeiros pais não têm férias em amar incondicionalmente os filhos ou filhas, simplesmente amam-nos até à morte. Desafinamentos, discórdias, erros causados por decisões irreflectidas; sempre as vai haver, mas quando assim os esposos e ou as famílias tem a opção de se voltar para a Igreja, Esta tem planos de acolhimento e de lembrar os conjuges de se voltarem a recorrer ao amor recomendado pelo Sacramento do Matrimónio. Jesus estava no meio de Maria e José, cada família também deve ter, por mais filhos que tenha o Jesus Cristo no seio de cada família. Ele ama as famílias e as quer vivendo em unidade e amor fraterno.

Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph

Sir 3:2-6, 12-14 | Col 3:12-21 | Lk 2:41-52

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience.

These are the attributes Paul instructs the Colossians in today's reading to "put on" or to "clothe" themselves with. It's quite a list, isn't it? Paul goes on to talk about the virtues of the Christian family, which is fitting for today's Feast of the Holy Family. It is reasonable to expect, then, that the Gospel passage would follow through by expounding on the virtues of *the perfect family*: Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. Instead, in Luke's Gospel, we have the only story in all of Scripture of Jesus' childhood. The only one that shows the specific interactions of them as a family – it tells the story of Jesus at age 12 who stays in Jerusalem without Mary and Joseph knowing and who are unable to find him for days. Prayerfully reflecting on this unique glimpse of the Holy Family working through misunderstandings, fear, and hurt helps us relate even more to the true humanness of Jesus and the Holy Family.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

In the Holy Family, we see a model of relationship in human form. We are part of a holy family as well: we are children of God. And like Mary and Joseph, our family is enriched and strengthened when we are attentive to the presence of Jesus in our lives. Luke writes: "[Mary] kept all these things in her heart." Like Mary, let us strive to hold Jesus' words and commandments in our hearts so we can focus on God's divine plan for our lives. In the next line of Paul's letter offering us the "tools" for loving relationships (compassion ... patience) he adds, "bearing with one another and forgiving one another." In other words: love. We must put Jesus, who is love, at the center of our relationships and do everything in his name. Then our family, and our lives, will be holy indeed.



Como he compartido anteriormente, no existe una familia “perfecta”. Incluso la Sagrada Familia luchó a su manera, como se ve en el relato del evangelio de este fin de semana, en el que José y María encontraron a Jesús mientras predicaba en el templo. El hecho de que tuviera que “estar en los negocios de su Padre” no disminuyó la ansiedad que sintieron cuando se dieron cuenta de que Jesús no había estado en la caravana durante varios días. Aunque el Hijo de Dios, Jesús “vino a Nazaret y les fue obediente”.

A pesar de las disfunciones y luchas que a veces experimentan nuestras familias, también estamos llamados a la santidad que es vivir nuestro Bautismo, como nos anima San Pablo en su carta a los Colosenses: “...sentido compasión, bondad, humildad, mansedumbre y paciencia, soportándonos unos a otros y perdonándonos unos a otros, si alguno tiene queja contra otro; Como el Señor los ha perdonado, así también nosotros debemos hacer. Y sobre todo esto vestirse de amor, es decir, del vínculo de la perfección.

En esto, la Sagrada Familia puede ser nuestra ayuda y nuestra guía.

Lecturas del día: 1 Samuel 1:20–22, 24–28 o bien Siráclido 3:2–6, 12–14; Salmo 84: 2–3, 5–6, 9–10; 1 Juan 3:1–2, 21–24 o bien Colosenses 3:12–21; Lucas 2:41–52.
José y María viajaron con Jesús, de doce años, a Jerusalén para la Pascua. Ya de camino a Nazaret, la pareja se da cuenta de que Jesús no va en su caravana, y llenos de ansiedad vuelven a Jerusalén en su busca. Lo encuentran en el templo participando en vivas conversaciones con maestros, lo que asombra a los concurrentes. Aunque María y José no comprenden completamente las acciones de Jesús, escuchamos que María “guardaba todas estas cosas en su corazón”. Lunes, 30 de diciembre

Octava de Navidad

La Octava de Navidad inicia el día de Navidad y termina el 1 de enero, Solemnidad de Santa María, Madre de Dios. Una octava es una fiesta o período de ocho días de celebración. Dos de los momentos más importantes del calendario litúrgico son la Octava de Pascua y la de Navidad. La celebración y la alegría experimentadas el día de Navidad se extienden por ocho días, para seguir reflexionando sobre la gloria de la temporada. Asista a misa para continuar celebrando la Navidad. *Lecturas del día: 1 Juan 2:12–17; Salmo 96:7–8a, 8b–9, 10; Lucas 2:36–40.*

Martes, 31 de diciembre

Luz verdadera

Escuchamos el prólogo del Evangelio de san Juan. Destacan temas que emergen a lo largo de ese evangelio, como la luz y la vida: “En ella [la Palabra] estaba la vida y la vida era la luz de los hombres; la luz brilló en las tinieblas, y las tinieblas no la comprendieron”. ¿Cómo dar testimonio de la luz verdadera, de Jesucristo, que nos ilumina? Con alguien a quien usted ama, comparta su experiencia de la luz de Cristo. *Lecturas del día: 1 Juan 2:18–21; Salmo 96:1–2, 11–12, 13; Juan 1:1–18.*

Miércoles, 1 de enero de 2025

Santa María, Madre de Dios

Desde el nacimiento de Jesús, “María conservaba y meditaba en su corazón” las palabras de los pastores sobre el niño Jesús. Al final de la Octava de Navidad, reflexione en silencio sobre la temporada y las gracias que le trajo. El nacimiento de un hijo a menudo es un torbellino para los padres, más aún para aquellos que han huido de la persecución. Pronuncie una oración o, si puede, envíe una donación a una organización que atiende a familias de refugiados. *Lecturas del día: Números 6:22–27; Salmo 67:2–3, 5, 6, 8; Gálatas 4:4–7; Lucas 2:16–21.*

Jueves, 2 de enero

Permanecer en él

En la primera lectura, Juan enfatiza la unidad del Padre y el Hijo: “Quien niega al Hijo, no tiene al Padre”. Luego tranquiliza a los fieles: “Permanezca fieles as lo que oyeron desde el principio”. Muchos se preparan para regresar al trabajo hoy, luego de las festividades navideñas. ¿Cómo puede usted dejar que la alegría de la Navidad permanezca en usted? Comience sus días con la oración centrada. Vuelva a la palabra sagrada que escogió a lo largo del día para que permanecer centrado en Cristo. *Lecturas del día: 1 Juan 2:22–28; Salmo 98:1, 2–3ab, 3cd–4; Juan 1:19–28.*

Hoy honramos el Santísimo Nombre de Jesús. ¿Qué nombre o título de Jesús en la Biblia le llama la atención a usted? (por ejemplo, Maestro, Príncipe de Paz, Predicador, Mesías, Salvador) Ore con el más relevante y reflexione sobre su significado para ti. *Lecturas del día: 1 Juan 2:29–3:6; Salmo 98:1, 3cd–4, 5–6; Juan 1:29–34.*

Sábado, 4 de enero

Santa Isabel Ana Seton

Isabel Ana Seton fue la primera ciudadana estadounidense nacida en el país en ser canonizada. Muerto su marido, se hizo católica y abrió una escuela para niños pobres y huérfanos. Fundó las Hermanas de la Caridad, sociedad religiosa que sirve a los marginados. Santa Isabel es la patrona de los conversos, las viudas y los ridiculizados por su piedad. Para honrarla, comuníquese con un maestro y pregúntele qué puede hacer para apoyarlo en su trabajo. *Lecturas del día: 1 Juan 3:7–10; Salmo 98:1, 7–8, 9; Juan 1:35–42.*
